

Traveling to Belize

We are so happy you are considering a journey to Belize to join us for class! Many of our students hope to explore the country a bit, either before or after class, and we encourage this. Note that the class time is dedicated to learning the material, processing and taking time to rest, journal, read, and getting to know your fellow students. You will stay in clean accommodations (either bunk bed rooms in the main building or large canvas tents in the garden) with access to flush toilets, electricity, real mattresses, running water and hot showers. All rooms are shared, though occasionally due to enrollment we may have a single available.

Weather can be cold to hot in February and March, but generally as we move into March is it hot and humid with cooler evenings. Natural breathable fabrics for layering are best, with a light jacket available to shield from passing showers or the wind in the evening.

Tours to temples and to see the country are best planned as additional days of your trip, as our focus will be on course material and spending free time on the farm. There are lots of things to do on the farm, including swimming in the salt water pool, exploring the garden grounds, climbing the water tower to watch the sunrise/sunset, visiting the grandmother ceiba tree, and chilling in a hammock while journaling, reading, or napping.
